We had a total of 11 vans in attendance with 2 cabins in Ardern's Caravan Park.


Whilst there, all activities arranged for our Rally were confirmed.

Destination—Mount Palmer W.A

Some 67 residential blocks were auctioned at the Southern Cross Courthouse, raising £3,969 for land that was worthless a few months earlier, and destined to be worthless again when the gold ran out a few years later. The average lot price was £40-£50. The surveyor reserved areas for a post office, police station, public hall, and churches. The town boasted boarding houses, bakeries, butchers, a school, and a medicine shop. As well there were three billiard saloons where two-up, dice, and SP betting were conducted.

Consequently, a grand hotel was planned for the centre of the town.

The Beginnng -Sunday Times - Perth - 11 August 1935, page 17

The new hotel at Palmer's Find, Yellowdine, is being erected for Miss A. M. Cummins by Messrs. Cavanagh, Cavanagh, and Tracey, architects, of Perth. A contract has been entered into with Todd Bros., contractors, to have the hotel completed before Christmas at a cost of £13,000 (one of the most expensive on the Goldfields). The building, in an Art Deco style of brick and cement construction, will be 76ft frontage to



Palmer street and 82ft frontage to Mackie street, with 27 bedrooms, 4 double and 26 single with 6 bathrooms, and three shower rooms all with hot water and all glazed with white tiles. There was a lounge bar, a public bar a saloon bar, lounge, dining room, and kitchens, staff accommodation, and all modern conveniences. A beautiful polished grand jarrah staircase accessed the two floors. There was Electric Lighting throughout and six lock-up garages for the use of patrons.

The End - Daily News - Perth 7 June 1947, page 6

Kalgoorlie, — Preliminary work has started on the erection of a modern store in Hannan Street for Selfridges (W.A) Ltd The building of the new premises will be from old material recovered from the deserted Mt. Palmer Hotel.

The Mt Palmer/Palmers Find hotel was opened on the 18th December 1936. However, this splendid building was to have a short life. In only a decade it went from opulence to desertion. In 1947 the very first chain store was approved to be built in Hannan Street, Kalgoorlie. However, the main problem was the lack of building materials. In May of 1947, a Perth businessman bought, sight unseen, the now deserted hotel at Palmer's Find at a cost of \$8,000.

It was at this time the only building left in the town. The building was made up of 200,000 bricks. Only 80,000 bricks were needed for the new store in Kalgoorlie and the balance of 120,000 bricks were offered to the State Housing Commission to build 5 new houses in Kalgoorlie. The store was what is now the Bank West building at 215 Hannan Street and was the first air-conditioned commercial premises on the Goldfields.

Truck Stops and Rules to Know



Most trucks are legally required to stop and rest every 12 to 14 hours as a safety measure. To assist truck drivers, State Governments have installed truck and car rest stops on the side of the highways throughout the country. Many RVs, caravanners and other travellers appreciate having a place off the road to rest and take a break as well.

It is important to note that these dedicated 'Truck Stops' are NOT designed as free campsites and generally caravans and RV's are not permitted. In Queensland, unless signposted otherwise, overnight stays are NOT permitted. There are general use rest areas that can be used by trucks, cars and recreational vehicles.

Truck drivers, as regular drivers on these roads, are fully aware of the location of these truck stops and plan their trips so that they can be reached at a certain time to stay within the legal driving periods. Failure to do so results in a very heavy fine.

Trucks and B-Doubles need wide and long spaces to enter, park and leave the rest areas and they often arrive in the middle of the night when most travellers are sleeping. As expected, truck drivers can get very upset if they arrive at the truck stop and find one or more RVs or caravans parked in the middle of the stopping bay.

In some cases, the thoughtlessness of the van or RV driver may not allow room for a long B-double to park behind or in front of the van. This may mean the truck driver has to decide whether to drive on to the next stop, but he may not have enough driving hours left to get there.

If you must stop in the truck stopping bays please have the courtesy to park at one of the ends of the bay leaving plenty of room for the long trucks that the stops were designed for. By parking close to each other, caravanners and RV's can allow uninterrupted space for the large trucks. Remember, trucks also need plenty of turning room, so don't park in any turning bays.

Another issue you may encounter is the loud refrigeration motors and air brakes found on many trucks. These can make the truck stop an unpleasant place to sleep in a caravan or RV but it would be unfair to complain. Truck stops are intended for trucks after all.

New Caravan Industry Electrical Standards November 2023



As the caravan industry gears up for a transformative shift, all eyes are on the impending arrival of brand-new standards that take effect November 2023. Titled AS/NZS3001.2:2022, these changes promise to revolutionise the way we approach portable connectable electrical installations, particularly in the realm of lithium battery standards. The standard is a detailed document and covers electrical installations in RVs as well as other connectable installation used for accommodation, habitation or commercial.

This blog will highlight a few of the changes around battery standards, specifically focusing on portable connectable electrical installations (Caravans, Motorhomes and Camper Trailers).

What is a portable connectable electrical installation? Put simply, any vehicle that has a 240V inlet plug fitted on the outside for mains power connection. These plugs are usually 15 Amp and connect to a battery management system within the van. At time of writing, vehicles without the hard wired 240V inlet are exempt from the latest standards changes.

While these changes may seem significant, they are indeed achievable and not overly complex. Let's delve into what these upcoming regulations mean for every caravan enthusiast.

Existing Power Installations:

Before we get into it, it's worth mentioning that if you already have a caravan with lithium batteries or inverters installed, and it was delivered before these new standards come into effect, there's no need to worry. The new caravan industry standards are not retrospectively enforceable. Only if you're upgrading your existing system from, say, AGM batteries to lithium, should you carefully consider the standard requirements.

Battery Fitment Standards:

Perhaps the most critical aspect of the new caravan industry standards is battery fitment. Contrary to some misconceptions, you don't need to mount your batteries outside the caravan. They can be safely installed internally in non-habitable areas such as storage locations, tunnel boots, and under beds. It's essential to follow the battery manufacturer's guide for proper installation, securing, and ventilation.

If you already have a power system installed before November 18, 2023, but want to make sure your system is still complying to the new rules one simple step is segregating the lithium batteries from the rest of the system with a wall and a secured lid as well as a gasket seal to ensure the portion of the build is gas proof.



This compartment can be made from any materials as long as it is sealed and secure. Another step is a single ventilation point, 20mm to the external of the caravan.

Solar Compliance:

For parallel connections of 3 or more solar panels, compliance with the new caravan industry standard also requires individual fusing for each panel before they are connected. This additional layer of safety ensures that a short circuit in one panel won't disrupt the entire system. Another new addition to the rules is the need for a fuse, circuit breaker, or a single point of isolation prior to the controller on the solar side. This isolation point is required regardless of the number of panels in the system and allows you to troubleshoot or test any issues you may be having with your panels or something else in the system.

In conclusion, the new lithium battery laws in the caravan industry represent a positive step towards enhanced safety and compliance. If you have any questions or concerns, simply reach out to your battery manufacturer, or don't hesitate to reach out to us and we can point you in the right direction. Always consult your installing electrician for clarity on the latest standards for your installation in your state.

What you need to know about feeding wild birds in Australia and how to do it properly

Is it ok to feed our wild birds?

Feeding wild birds is a controversial issue, especially in Australia. In some countries, it's actively encouraged – but in Australia, official advice from councils, environment departments and conservation and wildlife rescue groups warns against the dangers of feeding wild birds. In Western Australia, it's even illegal to feed native fauna, including birds, without a licence.



Still, millions of well-meaning Australians continue to enjoy feeding the birds in their backyard. Unfortunately, many don't realise that feeding wild birds can do more harm than good for our feathered friends – and if done incorrectly, can lead to serious problems including malnutrition, disease and unbalanced populations.

In an ideal world, people wouldn't feed wild birds at all – but with as many as 30 to 50% of Australian households feeding birds, it's important that people are aware of the risks of wild bird feeding and how to avoid harming the same wildlife they want to help.

In this guide, we unpack the complexities of wild bird feeding and address supplementary feeding, reducing the spread of disease and nutrition advice for birds for your consideration.

So, if you are going to feed wild birds, here's how to do it properly.

DON'T feed birds:

Bread, crackers or other human snacks

While bread is often the first food people reach for to feed the birds around them, it's often highly-processed and high in salt.

Bread contains little to no nutritional value for birds, and quickly fills a bird's stomach with empty calories and none of the energy or nutrients they need to stay healthy. Larger pieces can easily get stuck in their crops (the specialised pouch in their oesophagus used for storing food).

Bread also gets mouldy quickly, which is especially toxic for birds – mould spores can cause Aspergillosis, a potentially fatal respiratory infection. And in water, bread left uneaten by ducks and other waterfowl can even cause a build-up of toxic algae. In short, feeding birds bread is never a good idea.

Mince and raw meat.

It might be cheap and convenient, but mince also tops the list of bird-feeding nono's. Mince lacks calcium and other important nutrients that carnivorous and omnivorous birds would usually get from their natural diet Raw meat and mince can lead to calcium deficiencies in young birds — which in turn can cause brittle bones and beaks and even long-term metabolic bone disease. Mince can also stick to their beaks, causing bacterial infection. By feeding birds mince, you could be killing them with your kindness. Raw meat is also high in the wrong kinds of nutrients and minerals (like fat and phosphorous), so if you feed other meat to birds, make sure to add an insectivore supplement to it.

Honey and sugar.

Nectar-feeding birds like honeyeaters thrive on a diet of nectar and pollen from our native flowers, and other naturally-occurring sugary sweets like lerps, manna and honeydew. This food is abundant and rich in the energy and complex sugars they need to survive — unlike mixing water with sugar or honey, which are high in the wrong kinds of sugars.

Instead, we recommend planting a variety of flowering native shrubs as a safe and healthy food source for the nectar-feeding birds in your backyard

You CAN feed birds:

Bird nectar mix - Suitable for honeyeaters and lorikeets.

Fresh fruit and vegetables - Suitable for fruit-feeders such as parrots, pigeons and doves and bowerbirds.

Never feed birds avocado, citrus, onions or garlic – these foods are toxic for birds.

Earthworms, mealworms and insects - Suitable for insectivores like fantails, fairy-wrens, flycatchers and whistlers, and some carnivores like magpies and butcherbirds.

Seeds, nuts and grains - Suitable for parrots (including cockatoos, Galahs, corellas and rosellas), pigeons and doves and finches.

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

Steak Chilli Dutch Oven Camping Recipe

Ingredients

- 4 slices thick bacon cubed
- 2 large onions diced
- 4 cloves garlic minced
- 1 1/2 pound boneless chuck steak cubed in 1/2" pieces
- 2 cups beef stock
- 15 oz. can black beans drained and rinsed
- 15 oz. can diced tomatoes
- 1 teaspoon chipotle chilli powder*
- 1 teaspoon regular chilli powder*
- 1 teaspoon unsweetened cocoa powder*
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon*
- 1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper*
- 1 teaspoons ground cumin*
- 1 teaspoon sugar*
- 1 teaspoon salt*
- 1 teaspoon black pepper*
- Green onions sliced (optional)
- Sour cream optional
- Cheddar cheese shredded (optional)
- Lime wedges optional
- Jalapeno peppers sliced (optional

Instructions



Heat 12-inch Camp Dutch Oven.

Fry the bacon.

Add the onions, garlic and steak stirring occasionally till browned.

Then stir in the beef stock, black beans, diced tomatoes, chipotle chilli powder, regular chilli powder, cocoa powder, ground cinnamon, cayenne pepper, ground cumin, sugar, salt and black pepper.

Cover and simmer for 1 hour.

Remove lid and continue cooking until the chilli thickens to your liking.

Remove your Dutch oven from the heat and top with optional toppings green onions, s sour cream, cheddar cheese, lime wedges and jalapeno peppers.

The dangers of driving while dehydrated

W.A has just experienced a record heat spell, which has taxed not only our bodies but also our vehicles.

Driving while dehydrated can be a serious problem and many drivers do not consume enough fluids on long journeys. This is often to avoid too frequent stops.

The dangers of driving while dehydrated.

A few years ago, a university in the UK undertook an exercise to test the effects of dehydration on driving. Using driving simulators, a group of male drivers were tested when they were effectively hydrated. The same group undertook the same tests again when slightly dehydrated.

The result was that twice as many errors were made during the second series of tests compared to the first. Concentration levels were reduced, reaction times were slower, and their recall was impaired. There were also negative effects on the mood of the tested drivers.

The importance of proper hydration when driving.

The test mentioned above highlights some effects of driving while dehydrated. Other studies have found that the condition increases inattention and fatigue. This can lead to errors in maintaining a safe distance and the positioning of a vehicle (to avoid lane wandering or veering).

So, being hydrated helps keep you alert. This means you're better equipped to respond to poor or selfish driving behaviours of other road users. Yes, for long journeys, you might need a bathroom break or two, but exiting your vehicle, moving around and getting a little exercise as you take these breaks also helps to refresh your mind and body.

A failsafe way to check hydration is to observe the colour of your urine.

If dark and strong smelling, it can be a sign of dehydration.

Optimally urine should be pale and odourless.

Medications taken may affect the above.

Carbon Monoxide (CO) Monitor

Carbon monoxide, (CO), a highly toxic, colourless, odourless, flammable gas produced industrially for use in the manufacture of numerous organic and inorganic chemical products; it is also present in the exhaust gases of internal-combustion engines and furnaces as a result of incomplete conversion of carbon or carbon-containing fuels to carbon dioxide.



Carbon monoxide's toxicity is a consequence of its absorption by red blood cells in preference to oxygen, thus interfering with the transport of oxygen from the lungs to the tissues, in which it is required. Indication of carbon monoxide poisoning include headache, weakness, dizziness, nausea, fainting, and, in severe cases, coma, weak pulse, and respiratory failure. Treatment must be prompt and includes respiratory assistance and the administration of oxygen, often with 5 percent carbon dioxide and sometimes under high pressure.

If present in the air of your caravan in concentrations over 100 parts per million (PPM), it's considered dangerous to human health. Fortunately, there are CO detectors widely available on the market that are suitable for installation in a caravan. They operate in much the same way as smoke detectors and they cost around the same money. Be sure to follow the fitting instructions to ensure the alarm is installed at the correct height. CO has around the same density as air so it doesn't pool at the bottom of the van nor does it rise to the roof.
